NEW HOME FOR YOUR G.S.O.



A building between 31st and 32nd Streets, on the west side of Park Ave. *South* (formerly 4th Ave.), is the new home for G.S.O. and the Grapevine, as of April 1, 1970.

To find us, look for 468 Park Ave. South here in New York City.

To write to us, use same P. O. Box 459, New York, N.Y. 10017. Our telephone number, too, remains the same: (212) MUrray Hill 6-1100.

Why the move? The two main reasons are: (1) to save money, and (2) to get more space. Our old lease

expired, and we could not afford the higher rent necessary for staying. We save with an 11-year lease on the new quarters. And, more space! G.S.O. will occupy the 6th floor-13 offices, separate one for volunteers, reception room, expandable board and committee meeting room, lounge for women employees separate from rest room, etc.-all now being finished. Grapevine and Shipping will be on the 5th floor.

Our new location is better, too. The subway is only one-half block away, one stop downtown from Grand Central. Come see us!

This will be G.S.O.'s fifth home. The first in 1940 was at 30 Vesey Street, where Bill and the dedicated nonalcoholic secretary, Ruth Hock, had to answer all requests for A.A. help.

In 1944 we moved to 415 Lexington Ave., just across the street from Grand Central Station and right around the corner from New York's only (then) airline terminal.

For twenty years the various Conference areas in the United States and Canada have elected delegates to the annual meeting of our(North American)General Service Conference, where they have "official" A.A. business to transact. On the other hand, they have absolutely no power over anyone, of course, just like our General Service Board. Yet—both bodies act *for* the entire Fellowship and influence every one of us whether we know it or not.

Oddly enough, it all works!

To figure this out, we could ask ourselves, "What would it mean to to *you* if A.A. held a G.S. Conference and no one came but *your* area delegate? Or everyone's *but* yours?"

Let's look at some questions:

• Have A.A. members in your region had experience with doctors?

· Members' hired as "A.A. counselors"?

• Members who solicit business at meetings (selling life insurance, beauty products, etc.)?

These are all topics on the Conference agenda this year.

Your group—or others nearby may have worked out these matters. Groups in other parts of North America need to hear about your experience.

In 1950, 141 E. 44th Street became our third home (GV joined us there), and in 1960 we moved to the 18th floor of 305 E. 45th Street.

MANY GROUP MEETING PROBLEMS SOLVED FREE


"Drunk-o-logues everybody has heard a jillion times generate boredom, and attendance falls off. How can we keep meetings alive and instructive?" asks a recent letter from Arkansas.

Many groups ask such questions, so we remind you of the many *Guidelines* any member can get free from G.S.O. These are up-todate "service suggestions" in mimeographed form.

They cover: (1) Working with alcoholic rehab centers; (2) Central Offices, or Intergroup committees; (3) Club problems; (4) Regional conferences and conventions—including free displays; (5) Working with courts; (6) Institutional committees (carrying the message into hospitals, jails, etc.); (7) Public Information work;(8) A.A.—Al-Anon relationships.

In addition, on G.S.O.'s regular publications order blank you'll find "The A.A. Group"—a 20¢ pamphlet which tells how to hold all kinds of meetings. *The Newcom*ers' Meeting Kit (\$1.00) includes a new outline of "Suggestions for Beginners' Meetings" and a packet of basic pamphlets.

If your group needs fresh blood, the *Public Information Kit* (\$1.50) has tips on getting newspapers, radio, and TV to help you carry the message anonymously, plus a pamphlet on "How to Speak at Non-A.A. Meetings."



"Alcoholism is a Management Problem—A.A. Suggests One Solution," says the bright blue cover of A.A.'s newest pamphlet carrying the message to employers.

"The Alcoholics Anonymous Survey: 11,355 A.A. Members Answer Questions About Themselves" is the title of the new booklet summarizing the sobriety survey made throughout the U.S.A. and Canada in the summer of 1968.

These latest publications are planned to be of help to (1) any A.A. who wants to keep up with where the movement is heading today, (2) any employer with an alcoholic on his payroll, or (3) any professional person who comes into contact with alcoholics. The management folder tells briefly how A.A. can cooperate with any organization who wants our services, and what can happen when business concerns use A.A.

The new survey pamphlet reviews the findings on length of sobriety, slips, meeting attendance rates, age, and sex of A.A. members.

It also shows what gets people to come to A.A., the lowering average age of members, and the rising percentage of women in A.A.

Both pamphlets are available from G.S.O., the Management one at a price of 5ϕ each (3ϕ each in lots of 500 or more). The price of our Survey pamphlet will be 15ϕ per copy.

FILMS AVAILABLE FREE FOR INSTITUTIONS

"Bill's Own Story" and "Wisdom to Know the Difference" are now available for free distribution to hospitals and correctional institutions. So are "Days of Wine and Roses," "Case 258," and "Faith for Today" (just write G.S.O.).

In "Bill's Own Story" (1-hour color), A.A.'s surviving co-founder tells about his last drinking, his recovery, Dr. Bob, and the first A.A. group.

"Wisdom to Know the Difference" (1-hr. b-w) shows a discussion meeting, plus comments by two nonalcoholic trustees John L. Norris, M.D. and Austin MacCormick, and Msgr. Joseph Dunn, N.Y. Police Dept. chaplain.

BIG BOOK IN PORTUGUESE

Brazilian alcoholics for many years had to make do with their neighbors' Spanish edition of the book "Alcoholics Anonymous." They could grasp most of it, but longed to see it in their own tongue and worked for months translating.

Portuguese-speaking A.A.'s in the U.S.A. reviewed the translation for A.A.W.S., Inc., and pronounced it, "Great!"

Result: the Portuguese edition of "Alcoholics Anonymous" (bright, shiny blue binding) now sells for \$2.00 (U.S.A. money), available from the Literature Distribution Center, Caixa Postal 20896, Sao Paolo, Brazil.

"Our first G.S.R. workshop in Iowa's district 1 seemed to be very much of a success and a lot of enthusiasm shown," wrote Marie. "This being committee member is all new to me and most of the G.S.R.'s are new, too.

"We voted to hold a workshop the first Sunday of each month, to start at

2:00 p.m. and close at 3:30 p.m. It will be held at a different group each month, and the host group will furnish coffee and cookies.

"It was suggested during the workshop that each group should help pay expenses for the G.S.R. when at conference meetings or if traveling very far. Films and where to get them, round-table discussions and round robins were all discussed and explained.

"Then a very important subject was brought up-SPONSORSHIP, and how important it can be. Most of us liked the suggestion that after the meeting, we introduce ourselves to a new member and ask if he has a way to get to and from meetings and offer to pick him up. If he has no sponsor, offer to be his or her sponsor until such time as he has a chance to make up his own mind and pick one for himself. In short, take a little personal interest in a new member and put a little effort behind it.

"A question was raised about a telephone contact where a group is small and money short. Answering services are okay, but costly. This was to be brought before each group and discussed again at the next G.S.R. meeting." (Thanks, Marie, for sharing.)

TV SHOW BASED ON "IS A.A. FOR YOU?"

"If You NEED a Drink," a onehour color show produced on KNXT-TV (CBS) in Los Angeles was partly based on the questions from the A.A. pamphlet "Is A.A. For You?" and it brought in more than 2,000 calls from alcoholics one night—over 1,300 of them early-stage victims.

The show resulted from longterm careful planning and cooperation among the Los Angeles A.A. Central Office and its Public Information Committee, the Los Angeles Council on Alcoholism, and the Valley A.A. office. Ten A.A.'s and one Al-Anon appeared, and no anonymity breaks occurred.

As questions from the A.A. pamphlet flashed on the screen, they were answered by different A.A. members (seen only in silhouette) from their own experience.

A.A. IN VIETNAM

To most of us at home, Da Nang is a spot on a map in a TV news show, where bombing, bombardments, and ambushes take place.

But something good is quietly going on there, too, Clarence B. writes us.

"We have made some progress... we now have three meetings a week at the Marine Air Base; Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Sun., providing 'Charlie' doesn't interfere.

"If anyone is heading out here, tell them to contact Chaplain Berger at the Tein Sha Navy Base as that is where we usually meet for transportation. He supports A.A. all the way and has the backing of all the commands around here.
