A brand-new, 64-page, 6x9 hardcover book of the Grapevine's funniest cartoons from the last 25 years will bow at Miami!


Most are by anonymous but famous cartoonists, members of course.

HOW A.A. GROWS

How fast is A.A. growing? Is growth more rapid than it was? This chart shows the number of groups and members as reported each year to the General Service Office.

The General Service Board's P.I. Committee is currently using the figure 425,000 as the approximate total membership.

This figure was determined as a result of a special census survey.

HOW IT WORKS ON THE 18th FLOOR
